Sermon Reflection Questions

- Compromise is always easier than holiness, and it leads us down a path of even more compromise and sin. When in the past have you compromised your commitment to God? What were the results?
- Which area in your life are you most tempted to compromise in?
- The process of remembering and celebrating what God has done is an act of worship. What are some of things you can celebrate that God has done in and through you?
- God uses confrontation—through the Scriptures and our fellow Christians to redeem us when we compromise.
 - How have you seen this play out in your life?
 - How do you receive confrontation?
 - Are you willing to confront others? Why or why not?
- Each time Nehemiah confronts the people of their compromise, he prayed a prayer for God to “remember him” in his faithfulness even when his work might appear fruitless. How do you want God to remember you?
- Although it seems that the story of Nehemiah ends in failure, How does Jesus truly finish the work of redemption and restoration for us? And what does it mean to you personally?
